SENIOR PASTOR, FRIENDSHIP-WEST BAPTIST CHURCH,
DALLAS, TX

Known as a passionate orator, leader and activist, Dr. Haynes has served as senior pastor of Friendship-West Baptist Church in Dallas for 28 years, growing its membership from 500 to more than 12,000 persons. He is known for his work against racial, social and economic injustice and transforming the lives of the disenfranchised. He is the author of *Healing Our Broken Village* and the daily devotional *Soul Fitness*. In 2009, he launched a two-hour weekly radio show, *Freddy Haynes Unscripted, Edutainment Radio for Community Empowerment* on Radio One's 94.5 K-Soul FM in Dallas. He holds a bachelor's degree from Bishop College, a master of divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and a doctor of ministry from the Graduate Theological Foundation, and pursued graduate work at Oxford University. Dr. Haynes also has received two honorary doctoral degrees.

Diane Nash

FREEDOM RIDER AND CIVIL RIGHTS LEADER

One of the most respected student leaders of the sit-in movement for civil rights in Nashville in the early 1960s, Diane Nash was a founding member of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. Raised in Chicago and a student at Howard and Fisk universities, she was shocked at the segregation she encountered in Tennessee. She was jailed for her participation at a lunch counter sit-in with the Rock Hill Nine in South Carolina. When the Freedom Riders' bus was burned in Anniston, Alabama, she argued that they had a duty to continue – a conviction that brought her nose-to-nose with John Seigenthaler, assistant to Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy. She won both the encounter and Seigenthaler's respect. Ms. Nash played a key role in bringing Martin Luther King Jr. to Montgomery, Alabama, in support of the Riders. In 1962 she was sentenced to two years in prison for teaching nonviolent tactics to children in Jackson, Mississippi, though later released on appeal. She was instrumental in the Birmingham desegregation campaign of 1963 and the Selma Voting Rights Campaign of 1965 before returning to Chicago to work in education and fair housing.

Julian Bond

ACTIVIST, STATESMAN, COMMENTATOR, WRITER

From his leadership in the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee as a college student in 1960 to his service as chairman of the board of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People until 2010, Julian Bond has dedicated his life to justice – as an activist, statesman, writer, teacher, lecturer and poet. Elected in 1965 to the Georgia House of Representatives, he was prevented from taking his seat by other members, was re-elected to his own vacancy, unseated again, and reelected only after unanimous decision of the U.S. Supreme Court. He ultimately served four terms in the house and six in the Senate. In 1968, he was nominated for vice-president of the United States by the Democrats, but withdrew because he was too young to serve. He has narrated numerous documentaries and movies, and appeared as a commentator on national radio and TV. He is the author of many books, including poetry and essays. Mr. Bond served as NAACP chairman from 1998 until 2010, and, among other numerous recognitions, received the National Freedom Award in 2002. He has taught at six major universities.
